



## Sea Monster Soapysuds

Educational game for distinguishing between left and right.  
For players up to the age of 4

The little sea monster Soapysuds loves bathing - sometimes to the left, sometimes to the right and sometimes head first. Do you know when it is looking to the right and to the left?

Game alternative 1: The cards with the bath towel are taken out. The cards with a green border are openly distributed on the table. The cards with a yellow border are shuffled and placed on the table in a covered stack. In turn, the game master or alternatively the children pick up the uppermost card and place it on the table. Whoever is first to find the sea monster looking in the correct direction and sitting in the correct bath specified by the card wins the card. Whoever has the most cards is the winner at the end of the game.

Game alternative 2: The sea monster has had enough of bathing and is now looking for his towel. The cards with a green border are openly distributed on the table. The cards with the towel are shuffled and placed on the table in a covered stack. The uppermost card is turned over. Whoever first finds the sea monster seeing his towel in accordance with the drawn card wins the card.

Game alternative 3 (speech comprehension): The cards with a green border are openly distributed on the table. All other cards are shuffled and placed on the table in a covered stack. The uppermost card is turned over. The player/game master reads out the order in accordance with the game alternatives 1 and 2, e.g.: "The sea monster sits in the red bath and is looking to the left." If the player makes a mistake while reading, he may not join the search during the next card. Whoever first finds the sought sea monster wins the card.

Game alternative 4: The green bordered cards can be played according to memory rules. Pairs are either cards with the same bath colour but with the sea monster looking in different directions or cards with the same bath colour, with the sea monster looking in the same direction but once with its head up and once with its head down.
